Breaking New Ground

For its 45th annual auction, the Creston Fire Department set a big goal: Bring in enough money to enhance the Lake Blaine station with a new training facility for the department's volunteer firefighters and medical responders.

"The plan is to finish the project without using any tax dollars," Chief Gary Mahugh said before last April's auction. "I think that's really important, particularly in today's economy."

That economy—along with the weekend's weather—put a damper on attendance and thus the amount of money raised this year. Consignor and bidder numbers were both lower than expected. The department netted about \$25,000 after event expenses and paying about 80% of the amount raised to consignors. That's down from about \$35,000 in 2010.

Although the numbers were lower than hoped, it's enough to put the building in place when combined with some money remaining from the 2010 auction and other donations.

"We may have to wait on some of the finish work in the interior, but by August we'll be using the space for training," Mahugh said.

Excavation at the Lake Blaine site has already begun in preparation for the move of an unused modular classroom acquired from the Bigfork School District, the northern portion of which lies in the Creston Fire District. An existing building on the site must be shifted to make room for the new portable structure, a change that will require concrete and utility work for both buildings. A new steel roof and interior upgrades are also eventually planned for the threeclassroom portable.

The building will be used as indoor training space for the firefighters and medical responders. For several years, they have been meeting inside a truck bay at the station before moving outside for practical training.

"This opportunity came with good timing," Mahugh said. "The project has been on the books for years, and the generous contribution of the Bigfork School District made this possible."

The fire district's trustees have agreed to accept the new building as district property once it's completed, which ensures ongoing operational costs will be covered by the district.

Lake Blaine Open House Planned

The Creston Fire Department will hold an open house and community picnic at the Lake Blaine fire station on Lake Blaine Road later this year to celebrate completion of its new training building.

A date has not yet been set for the event, but it is tentatively planned for late summer or early fall. The exact date and time will be posted on the reader board at the Creston fire station and online at the "Creston Auction" page on Facebook (http://www.facebook.com/).

Community members will have the opportunity to tour the new building and learn about how it will be used. The picnic that follows will be potluck style, so please bring a dish to share. The fire department will supply snacks and beverages. Friends and family are welcome, but please leave your pets at home. Spotlight on Safety: Waiting for the Water

As water and snowpack levels rise around the valley, flood stories have become front-page standards. In Creston, the fire department is closely watching sloughs and creeks, particularly along Foothill Road, near Echo Lake and around Lake Blaine, as well as the portion of the Flathead River that stretches south from the Old Steel Bridge.

"Two things are going to get us," Creston Fire Chief Gary Mahugh told attendees of a recent CFFAM meeting, "rainfall and warm temperatures."

The valley has seen plenty of both in recent weeks. The fire department is heavily involved in the countywide effort to assess and monitor flood-prone areas and is prepared for its primary role in high-water situations: ensuring life safety.

"Fire we can manage," Mahugh said. "But the thing about flooding is there's not a lot we can do with it." Despite frequent discussion of sandbagging to redirect water, Mahugh says that such efforts must be done properly to be effective and avoid creating an issue for neighboring properties. He instead emphasized that people should focus on basic personal safety if flooding occurs:

• Avoid working directly in flood water, as it can be contaminated by septic systems, animal carcasses and bacteria.

• Wash hands vigorously and thoroughly after any contact with flood water.

• Ensure shots are current, including

those for hepatitis A and B and tetanus.
Secure propane tanks with a chain or cable to a nearby tree. If you must leave your home due to flooding, close valves.

• Don't drive through water over roadways, as depths can be deceiving.

• Have a 72-hour emergency kit on hand. A good source for kit components is http://www.ready.gov/america/getakit.

"It's such a huge undertaking. We are really trying to lighten the load on the members of the fire department," said CFFAM member Gloria Graves. "We work hard to get community volunteers to help in the different areas of the auction, because it always happens: [the fire department gets] called out for a fire or medical emergency during the sale."

This summer, CFFAM's core members are looking for ways to relieve some of the pressure in the spring and get a jump on planning. The members also want to keep the group together and on the radar of the community throughout the year. This is particularly important because the group is crucial in providing emergency support for the department, including making sure responders have enough food and beverages when they are on scene at a fire or during a flood.

"It isn't just the auction," Graves said. The summer CFFAM meetings are about community and sharing ideas, as well as the following upcoming events: **Early summer/late fall: Open House and Picnic, Lake Blaine Fire Station.** The next CFFAM meeting will focus on the open house of the fire department's new training building (see p. 1). **October: Soup for Supper, Creston Fire**

Station.

Our Soup for Supper evening has become a mainstay for the community in the fall. We will be shifting the event back to National Fire Prevention Week this year and will need volunteers to prepare soups and desserts. We are also hoping to have a raffle at this year's fundraiser and are accepting donations.
