The Chief's Corner: What Happens When We Think We Can

After 18 months of creative thinking, hundreds of fire fighter and associate member hours and a bit of hired labor, our Lake Blaine Training Facility has taken on a new look and a new function. For many years we have trained at Lake Blaine Station in two buildings that were built specifically for structure fire training —one is a two-story "house" and the other is a live- burn building. Missing was a classroom on-site and a place for fire fighters to spend time comfortably. That has now changed.

Thanks to a strategic partnership with Bigfork Schools, Creston Fire acquired a three-room modular classroom building that was moved to the Lake Blaine Road site in four sections. Placement of the modular building required the relocation of the two-story training building as our space is limited. Once the modular was moved and set up, a new roof was added to protect the interior and work began transforming the building into a multi-use facility. One room remained a classroom with an interior refurbishment, audio/ visual equipment was added and comfortable seating was installed. Another room has become a fitness room where several pieces of exercise equipment have been

moved. Our fire department encourages personal fitness as the job is not an easy one. The third room has been transformed into a staff quarters complete with four bunk rooms, a kitchen and casual seating and study area.

While 24-hour station staffing is not part of what we do today, this facility will allow fire fighters to spend time at this station as their schedules permit and it will allow for more formal staffing down the road. Staffed stations for volunteer fire departments cannot be a realistic community expectation; however, we now have a place for that to occur on an intermittent basis.

A side benefit to this project is that it allows us to host others at this site, right down to having a place for outside instructors to stay. This is a big deal, as all local fire departments rely on their neighbors for mutual aid and training together is a key to success. Up until now we have been limited in what we could provide.

And the capper to all this is that approximately 90% of this project has been funded with non-tax dollars. Contributions from donations and the

annual Creston Auction have been used. Being fiscally responsible has long been a trend at Creston Fire—we have a history of accomplishing a lot with very little. This project is another example of what can happen when an organization thinks it can rather than thinking it can't. Our Creston fire fighters seldom say they can't.

CFD Member Receives Award for Life-Saving Efforts



The biggest fundraising event for the ALERT air ambulance service takes place annually at the Flathead County Fairgrounds. The past year of ALERT's operation, the people it touched, and the presentation of the Clyde Smith Award are highlights of the evening's program.

The ALERT foundation established the Clyde Smith Award, honoring the man who offered his business, Smith Logging, as collateral against the original loan that funded the hospital's purchase of its own helicopter. Each year at the banquet, the ALERT board presents the award to a member of an emergency medical service or quick response unit. The recipient is chosen from across northwest Montana for his or her dedication, volunteerism and service toward life-saving efforts in the community.

In 2012, the Clyde Smith Award was presented to William Tidwell, EMT, known to many as "Wild Bill." He has been an EMT volunteer for over 20 years in the Flathead Valley and is currently deputy chief and the medical training officer for Creston Fire. As a volunteer, Bill responds to over 140 medical and fire calls each year. He is also a current member of the Flathead County EMS Advisory Committee.

For 15 years, Bill owned a wilderness guide service gaining valuable experience. He was one of the only outfitters in the Bob Marshall Wilderness to have radio communications for requesting ALERT. He has been instrumental in coordinating between Kalispell Regional Medical Center, the Spotted Bear Ranger District and area ranchers for safe landing sites for the ALERT crews.

Since the early 1990s, Bill has taught hundreds of CPR,

first aid, wilderness first aid, and health/safety classes to fire departments, quick response units, and the public. Bill teaches these classes to at least 1200 people each year estimating that in his career, he has shared his pearls of "the mental medical toolbox" to over 21,000 responders.

Creston Fire is very proud to salute one of its own.

Getting the Best out of the 2013 Creston Auction

Tips for Sellers

- Advertise your treasures: Contact us in early March to include your larger items for free in our ads throughout northwest Montana.
- List it: For faster service and to insure you are paid in full, bring a list of the items in your load on Consignment Day.
- Consign and donate: Bring all items to the sale grounds Friday, April 5, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.
- Give your best: Donations are welcome and tax deductible. Consider donating one or more items from your load to the Creston Fire Department for the sale.
- Think like a buyer: If you wouldn't spend \$5 on an item, please donate it to the Rummage Sale. All proceeds from items that sell for \$5 or less in the auction are donated to the fire department, so improve the sale by taking these items to the Creston School gym's west door.
- Organize your load: Rather than handing over a box with books, canning jars and videos, make one box for each type of item so that it is easy to sell.
- Form a group: Collect items at your church, school, etc., and bring them as one load to the sale. We'll send the

proceeds (minus the fire department's commission) to your organization.

- Take junk to the dump: We also cannot accept tires, hazardous chemicals, ammunition or livestock.
- Prepare for weather: Bring disposable tarps to cover your items. We regret that we cannot guarantee their return.
- Sleep soundly: We provide security for all consigned items from Friday, April 5, through the sale Sunday, April 7.
- Note this: At Saturday's auction, no items are sold with minimum bids attached. At Sunday's equipment sale, a minimum bid can be set at \$1500 or more. Call 250-7396 for more information on reserves and titles.

Tips for Buyers

- Pack cash: We accept MasterCard and Visa for auction purchases only, so bring cash, checks or your ATM card.
- Buy your ticket: The auction's \$5 bid tickets go on sale at 8 a.m. Saturday. Get \$10 bid tickets for the equipment sale at 9 a.m. Sunday. These fees pay for security.
- Carry ID: Show it to buy a bid ticket.
- **Bid away:** There is no buyer's premium. Your winning bid is what you pay.
- Stay warm: Hot food is available

throughout Saturday and Sunday.

- Treat your sweet tooth: Visit the Bake Sale in the Creston School gym on Saturday from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Even better, donate your favorite goodie! Call 250-7396 for drop-off times.
- Get artsy: The Arts & Crafts Sale is held Saturday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Eastside Grange Hall.
- **Keep it clean:** Federal rules prohibit smoking on the school grounds. And please leave your dogs at home.
